It's about a simpler, purer way of life. About values of hard work and integrity. What it means to each of us, individually, to be an Australian. And how we pass that meaning, that story, on to the people and the nation we leave behind.

It's about Alan and Shelley.

Alan and Shelley Green are country people through-and-through, both steeped in the traditions of rural life. Alan was born and raised on a cattle station in Western Queensland, and lived on a station in Northern Territory. Shelley was a nurse in rural Queensland and often came across the RFDS through work. They started their own farm in rural Victoria in the 80's.

Mental health services in rural communities is a big thing for us. The RFDS is beyond lifesaving, whether you've got a broken leg or a broken heart, they will be there. **W** I was very fortunate to grow up in a family with a very strong work ethic. Not a lot of dollars thrown around, but good hard work.

Shelley and I came down to Victoria in '82 and after a long drought purchased a block of land that was very sparse and started to regenerate the land. Shelley nursed, and I set up a small contracting business. Then in 1999 we started Green Eggs, a free-range egg business. Chooks are 24 hours a day, seven days a week. We grew it from 2,000 birds to 40,000.

The Flying Doctor was part of my life from when I was born. To this day, I remember Dr. Tim O'Leary and his pilot Keith Killen flying into the station clinic once a month.

I remember them vividly because I was badly burned as a two-year-old on the back of my legs and feet. They flew me to Brisbane – six months in hospital, skin grafts – then home again. Our passion for the Flying Doctor has always been there. For the work they do in the outback, and for providing services to people in regional Victoria too. They go where they're needed, to help people affected by distance. Whether it's closing a 10 hour gap to an accident in the outback, or a 3 hour gap to provide a dental service in regional Victoria.

We've always donated to the Flying Doctor every year at tax time, but we decided to include a gift to the RFDS in our Wills when our son James died ten years ago. Our focus now is that James missed out on his future, so we are very much about the future of the RFDS.

We've got two other kids, and we let them know that whatever's left will be split three ways, because James is still with us... he's at the Royal Flying Doctor Service.

When Gillian Knight moved from Melbourne to Lakes Entrance in her sixties, she decided it was time to indulge her passion for adventure by travelling solo all over Australia in a one-person tent. It wasn't until she was 76 that Gillian swapped the tent for the relative luxury of a small caravan. And she continued her travel adventures well into her eighties.

I was one of the original grey nomads and the only women I came across traveling alone.

I can't bear the cold, so I used to take off every winter to spend two or three months up in the tropics. Everyone thought I was mad. But I thought, 'No, I'm just adventurous.'

I've crossed the Nullarbor three times. I've been to Tasmania twice. I've been up the East Coast countless times.

I've had quite a few adventures I've never told anybody about. And a few crises too.

I had to find a dentist twice. I was admitted to hospital in Karratha. And I was halfway between Cobar and Bourke with 100 kilometres of nothing, just trees, no houses, and I had a blowout on a caravan. But I'm not a panic merchant. If something happens, I just work through it.

It was very comforting to know the Flying Doctor was out there. Traveling through the outback I could see the huge distances, and I thought, "Well, I'm traveling on my own, so I will donate to the RFDS as an insurance policy."

I've been donating for decades, but recently I thought I would leave some of my money to the Flying Doctor in my Will.

It's a fantastic service and there's always going to be miles and miles between stations in the outback, because it'll never be closely settled.

People thought I was mad.
I thought, 'No, I'm just adventurous'.
And I had a marvellous time. II

It doesn't matter where you grew up, where you call home, or where you've travelled... something inside you sees and feels the deep connections that run through us all, making the Australian whole greater than the sum of its parts.

It's about Don.

Retired country hospital administrator, Don Mahaffy, knows just how badly the Flying Doctor is needed by isolated communities. He's also had first-hand experience of our service, when a severe staph infection left him needing emergency evacuation while on holiday on the Murray River. The infection was so aggressive, Don lost his leg, but he credits the RFDS with saving his life.

I was on a four month cruise when one night I had this pain in my left foot. I retired to my cabin, but just got sicker and sicker.

I don't remember a lot, it was so severe I was unconscious most of the time, but they offloaded me to a country hospital at Waikerie. They had no idea what it was, so they called the Flying Doctor.

It was a severe staph infection. I'm a diabetic, and it got progressively worse. The bones in my foot were practically destroyed in three days. They had to take my leg, but I owe my life to the Flying Doctor.

During one period of my career I was CEO at a couple of country hospitals, I thoroughly enjoyed those two experiences. Great history. Real plains country. Wonderful people. But they are so isolated, the Royal Flying Doctor Service is essential to them. It plays an immeasurable role in all parts of their lives, from beginning to end.

I see the gift I'm leaving in my Will as a tribute to the Flying Doctor, and a tribute to my first wife and my son, who both died from the same cancer, 16 years apart. Without the Flying Doctor, I would've been joining them.

I remarried recently. Judith's a lovely woman. It's just amazing how life goes. We met through church and we had a lovely church wedding.

Because I was remarrying I wanted to update my Will, and saw that as a prime opportunity to include a bequest to the Flying Doctor. My daughter is executor, and I discussed it all with her. She said, "Dad, that's fantastic!"

I lost my leg, but without the Flying Doctor, I'd never have left that little country hospital. I'd have been in their morgue.

It's about Australians helping Australians.

We've all witnessed remarkable advances in life-saving medical science over the last 100 years. How to leave a gift in your Will...

Put your nearest and dearest first. Leaving a gift in your Will is not a choice between the people you love or the causes you care about. It's about how you can help both the way you want. After providing for your nearest and dearest, whatever you choose to leave Royal Flying Doctor Service Victoria will go on saving lives and helping people all over the country. Your lasting gift will keep the great Australian story you have been such an important part of alive.

Think about the type of gift you'd like to leave. There are a few different types of gifts you can leave to a cause you care about in your Will. The main three are detailed on the right of this page. All will make a life-changing difference. However, percentage or residual gifts are especially effective as they allow you to put your loved ones first, while maximising the impact of your lasting gift.

Talk to your solicitor. Your solicitor can draw up a Will for you, or update an existing Will if you have one, by adding a codicil. It's very easy to do. We have enclosed a wording guide to help your solicitor include Royal Flying Doctor Service Victoria in your Will. You can also download a pdf version at www.rfdsvic.org.au/legacywording. 3 types of gift

- 1 Percentage Gift You simply state in your Will what percentage of your estate you would like to be left to Royal Flying Doctor Service Victoria. Some people leave just a few percent, the average is around 7%. It's a clear and simple way to leave a gift to a cause that reflects your personal values, without negatively impacting your loved ones.
- 2 Residual Gift After your loved ones have been taken care of, and all costs have been dealt with, you can leave the remaining or residual portion of your estate to Royal Flying Doctor Service Victoria.
- **3** Lump Sum You simply declare the exact amount of money, or details of a specific asset, such as shares or a property, that you would like to leave to Royal Flying Doctor Service Victoria in your Will.
